COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Internships provide students with opportunities to integrate classroom knowledge, skills and methods with professional roles, responsibilities and activities in supervised settings. IDS4940 is a 1-3 credit, web-based course designed to complement your internship experience through guided reflection, critical analysis, synthesis and discussion. This course is offered for academic credit, graded on a pass/fail basis and fulfills upper division elective credit requirements.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

This course is designed to help students:

- 1) Identify, describe, and explain how the experience informed their sense of self and understanding of the internship area.
- 2) Analyze themes, conflicts, and issues that emerged and describe and explain how they were addressed.
- 3) Identify and connect the knowledge and/or skills gained in their coursework to their internship/practicum observations and experiences.
- 4) Describe and explain how the experience will modify and/or support future behaviors, attitudes, and career development

Journals (5 pts each; total of 30pts)

Journals should be 1 page (12 point text, 1" margins, double-spaced) and answer the questions related to the week.

Journal 1

What is your ultimate dream job (think five, 10 or 20 years down the road)? How can you use your current experience to reach that goal?

Journal 2

Picture yourself on the last day of your internship. What do you hope to have learned from this experience? What new skills will you have gained? How will you have changed?

Journal 3 - 5

For each journal, **choose one skill** from the list of transferable skills below and write how you have experienced and utilized it in your internship experience? How would you plan to develop and improve that particular skill in the future? Each journal must be on a different skill.

Conflict identification and management Managing success and failure Building relationships and networking Self-monitoring and project management Office culture and work values Team collaboration

Journal 6

A UF student has been hired by your company/organization for the internship next semester. If the student were to ask you how to make the most of the experience, what advice would you give?

Resume (15pts)

Submit a current resume that includes the internship position in way that markets the skills you are gaining. I would highly encourage you to utilize the Career Resource Center's resume services. This assignment will be graded for content and form.

Midterm Evaluation (10 Pts) & Final Evaluation (10pts)

Academic Connection Paper (15 Pts)

Write a 2-page paper (12 point text, 1" margins, double-spaced) demonstrating the connection between your academic studies and your internship. This should not necessarily focus alone on your major, but on the connections between skills you have gained in both major and non-major courses and the activities you do in your internship site. You can include:

- why you study what you study
- why you are interning where you are interning
- what the connection is between the two
- how your studies have helped you succeed at the internship
- how your internship will help you succeed in future classes

Final Paper (3 Parts; 20 pts total)

PART I: Write a one-page (12 point text, 1" margins, double-spaced) description of your internship and your internship site to be shared with other liberal arts students. The goal of this assignment is to help other students

learn about the company or organization as a potential internship site by describing your role and responsibilities. This should be a "Day in the Life" description with a summary of an intern's typical day (time, responsibility, etc).

PART II: Write a one-page paper (12 point text, 1" margins, double-spaced) reflecting on your experience: what have you learned about the work environment as well as yourself. Part II will remain confidential. PART III: Write a one-page (12 point text, 1" margins, double-spaced) response to the following scenario. Part III will remain confidential.

Scenario: In a future interview, a recruiter asks you why you would make an ideal hire. Using your internship as a foundation for the response, write a qualitative overview demonstrating your advantages over other candidates. Include in your overview the following:

1. Your top two or three strengths – try not to use the strengths most commonly repeated in interviews (communication, time management, organization, interpersonal).

2. Concrete examples of how you developed these strengths during your internship.

GRADING:

This course is graded S-U only. In order to receive a Satisfactory grade in the course, students must earn 73 points out of 100 points and complete a minimum of 150 work hours over no fewer than 10 weeks.

Late work will only be given half credit and will be accepted no later than 7 days after the posted deadline. FAILURE TO TURN IN ALL ASSIGNMENTS WILL RESULT IN AN AUTOMATIC FAILING GRADE.
