Degree	Most UF students will enter a Physician Assistant program that offers a Master's Degrees or a Master's Option, and it is recommended that you complete a Master's level program in order to be well prepared for future changes in licensing requirements. In addition to the national exam, Physician Assistants must be supervised by a physician in order to practice, and this physician must sign the application for their state license.
Prerequisite Courses	The following are UF courses required for many physician assistant programs. Requirements vary widely from school to school, so it is your responsibility to check requirements of individual programs. We recommend using the PAEA Program Directory to check pre-requisite courses. Timing of Application	PA programs have varying application cycles. Some programs begin in the summer while others begin in the Fall or Spring. CASPA starts accepting applications in Mid-April each year, for the following year's entering class.

Personal	Most PA programs require a significant number of hands-on patient contact hours
